September general meeting and pot luck will move to to ST. MATTHEW CHURCH, 6021 Whittier (at Harper) this month only. Mayor Duggan will speak.

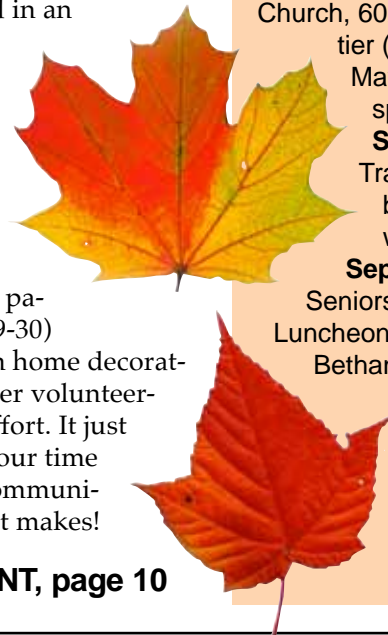

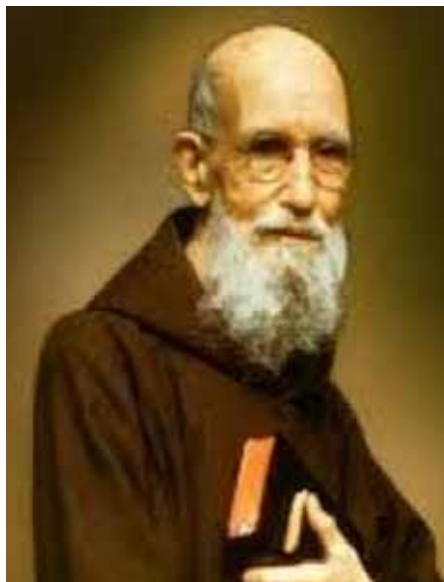

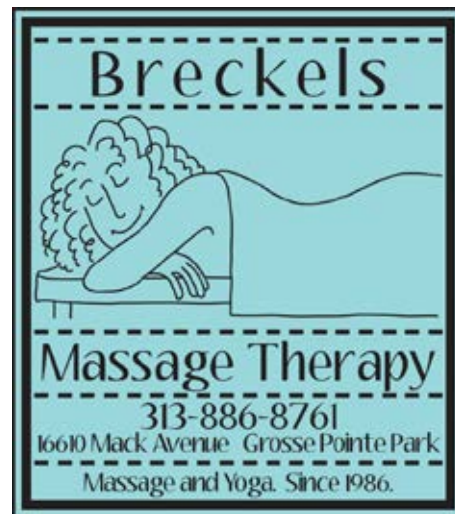

Judging EEV 2017 Landscaping Contest not exactly a walk in the park

Congratulations to all East English Villagers who planted some flowers, trimmed their shrubs and trees, mowed and manicured their lawns. It is truly impressive to see the pride people show for their homes and the unique personality reflected in how your homes have been landscaped and "decorated." There were ninety homes designated with Landscape Award signs with three chosen as our 2017 finalists: First Place Winner Keavon Hunter at 12671 Outer Drive, to Second Place Winners at 4449/4451 Kensington* and Third Place Winner Thomas Kwabena at 5530 Harvard. So how were the awardees chosen?

Thanks and appreciation to members of the Garden Club and Block Captains who provided recommendations. Your suggestions made the task less overwhelming.

Winning landscapes reflect the passion of the people living there. Winners love their homes and use landscaping to show off their homes and they enjoy the results of their hard work. The most impressive landscapes are those that have developed and evolved over a number of years, that look natural and complement the home.

The first impression is important - a color or combination of colors that stand out, variation in heights and slopes in how shrubs and trees are trimmed and complement or direct your eye to architectural features. Or the creation of a completely different environment such as a shade garden or naturalized yard.

Following the first impression, the amount of work in creating and caring for the gardens and lawn may merit award. Awards are also lost due to negative details such as: obvious weeds, lack of lawn care, a dead bush

that should be removed, the condition of the home - if there is peeling paint, or a fence that has fallen apart, it detracts from the landscaping. Home features may also determine a winner; a new driveway or the driveway gate of the First Place winner made that home a standout.

Selection of landscape awards is completely subjective and based on the personal biases of the judges. In this case I will tell you I am a sucker for flowers. A front yard without flowers will be difficult to grab my attention. An edged and manicured lawn is impressive, but is not something I will notice first, sorry. Some perennial blooms that were beautiful in June are

gone by early August, leaving bare stems that are not so impressive. Some of the most beautiful landscaping in EEV is in back of the house, and not considered in landscape judging at all.

Finally, if your home was selected as one of the top 3 awards in the recent past, it was decided not to consider your home this year. We try to highlight different homes each year. There is also an effort to distribute the awards for landscaping throughout EEV. Thank you to all of you, whether you got a sign or not, for continuing to make this neighborhood a beautiful place to live.
