Why Now?

For years our residents have expressed interest in establishing East English Village as a Special Assessment District ('SAD'). Establishing EEV as a SAD would allow residents to collectively fund private 24/7 security patrol and snow maintenance services for the neighborhood. Snow plowing would include the residential roads, all residential sidewalks and commercial sidewalks on Mack, East Warren, and Harper.

The costs are shared by every property owner within EEV's boundaries through a special assessment that would appear on each parcel's summer tax bill.

We conducted an online poll in September 2022 floating the idea of 24 hour security and snow plowing within our designated budget. 95% of respondents (182 votes) were interested in paying \$10-\$15/month for this service.


How much will it cost?

Each parcel's property tax bill will increase \$150/year (\$12.50/month) to fund the EEV Special Assessment District.

Roughly 80% of EEV's SAD budget will be allocated to fund 24/7 security patrol and 20% will be allocated to fund snow maintenance. Untapped SAD funds – in the event of a mild winter, for example – will be rolled-over and applied to owner tax bills for the following year.

Who will provide the services?

The FEV board has solicited quotes from City of Detroit licensed contractors, per the ordinance. The EEV board will evaluate the contractors' proposals and make the final selection on which contractors Please see the to hire. enclosed pamphlet from C.S.D.P. Security Services who provides SAD security for several other Detroit neighborhoods. We are currently evaluating their proposal.



What is the role of the City?

Detroit City Council passed an ordinance in 2014 allowing for the creation of Special Assessment Districts (Detroit City Code: Chapter 18, Article XII, Division 7). City Council ultimately votes whether to approve a SAD and exercises ongoing oversight authority of our SAD vendor contracts. Public meetings will be held during the approval process where residents can voice their concerns or support of the special assessment district.

If a majority of EEV homeowners (50%+) sign the petition in support, and if ultimately approved by City Council, the Treasurer's Office will include the special assessment fee on your summer property tax bill.

Collected SAD funds will be deposited into an account managed by the East English Village Association. This account will solely be used to pay SAD vendors and will be separate from existing EEV Association bank accounts. The City Treasurer's office provides City Council with an annual audit report summarizing EEV's SAD bank account activity and vendor contracts.

The SAD remains in place for a 7-year term before needing recertification. If at any point during the special assessment period our total special assessment costs (security + snow maintenance + city administrative fees) increase 15%+ beyond the initial budgeted amount (as of 2023), public notice and a hearing must be held.

SADs currently exist in other Detroit neighborhoods including University District, Sherwood Forest, and Palmer Woods.



What happens if I own two adjacent parcels or a 'side lot'? Will I have to pay 2x the fee?

The Special Assessment District tax is levied on individual parcels. If you own two adjacent parcels and want to avoid paying 2x the Special Assessment District fee, you must have the parcels legally combined. An application to combine parcels must be completed and submitted to the City Assessor's office. Please reach out to Alex Manwell if this applies to you.

Do we get any type of refund from the City since we will now be paying for these services ourselves?

Per the ordinance, services provided under a Special Assessment District are considered 'an expansion or addition to Services already provided by the City and are not a replacement for existing City-provided Services.' Thus, no refunds will be granted.

What's Been Done:

- In fall of 2022, the Detroit Department of Neighborhoods certified the East English Village Association as a Designated Neighborhood Improvement Organization ('DNIO').
- As a newly formed DNIO, we then requested the City Finance Department generate a circulation petition regarding a SAD for EEV. We received the petitions in January 2023.
- From January until April 2023 we are collecting signatures of homeowners who support the creation of a SAD. Per the ordinance, 50%+ of homeowners (1,076+ homes) within EEV's boundaries must sign the petition in support.
- We have begun soliciting quotes from security and snow removal vendors who have a track record of working with other Detroit SADs.

Special Assessment: What's Coming Up:

<u>January - March</u>

The SAD volunteers are actively collecting signatures from residents. Petitions will be available for signing at monthly EEV neighborhood meetings and events, and volunteers will be door-knocking to inform residents and to collect signatures.

<u>April</u>

Once we submit the required number signatures to the City Finance Department, the City Council will schedule a public hearing to discuss formation of the SAD and hear public comment. Residents will be notified of this meeting via our Facebook page and monthly newsletter. Our goal is to have enough signatures by April so that we can be on the City Council's agenda in April 2023.

Following the initial meeting, City Council will hold a second public hearing before certifying the creation of the SAD.

<u>Summer 2023</u>

We expect the initial Special Assessment District fee to be included in Summer 2023 tax bills.

Matters of the Heart

February is designated as Heart Health Month. It is a good reminder that heart disease is the leading cause of death for adult men and women in the United States.

A wise king once said, "Guard your heart, for out of it flows the wellsprings of life."

How do we guard our hearts, you may ask? First, we need to obtain certain critical information from our primary care doctor. We cannot assume that we have no risk of heart disease just because we do not feel ill. It's important to know your blood pressure, cholesterol levels and BMI. These numbers indicate risk for heart disease and should be monitored regularly. Further, your doctor can listen to your heartbeat, and if needed, may do an EKG test to get more information. If your numbers remain high, over time your risk increases.

Next, you need to adjust your lifestyle — in consultation with your doctor — to lower any risk factors that have been identified. Your lifestyle adjustment plan should assist and support you in making needed changes in the following areas: eating habits/diet; regular physical activity; sleep habits; smoking cessation (active and passive); stress reduction; and regular primary care visits. Achieving results takes time, but do not give up. One often overlooked aspect of well-being that may affect your heart is how you handle stress. Stress affects us physically as well as emotionally. Chronic and prolonged stress affects our risk of heart disease. Make sure to include this aspect in any plans to make lifestyle changes. If your doctor prescribes medication as part of your plan, take it as prescribed. Many people say, "I don't like taking pills." Be clear, no one likes taking medications. However, these medications are designed to save lives. It's not about what we like; it's about our responsibility to our family and ourselves to stay as healthy as possible.

Finally, we need to educate ourselves on heart disease, and the factors behind the numbers mentioned above, and why they are risk factors. One important piece of education should be the signs and symptoms of a heart attack. These may be very different in women than for men. Knowing the signs for both will help you know when to seek care right away and may save your life, or someone else's life. Remember, good health and well-being is granted to those who make it a priority, and

choose to keep informed, educated and make adjustments as needed throughout life. It's never too late to take care of your heart. Your heart health matters.

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


