We have received many complaints from caring EEV neighbors of suspected pet neglect resulting in Animal Care from the City of Detroit and Michigan Humane Society being contacted to resolve the issues. PLEASE, take care of your pets. Our EEV community is more vigilant than most and neighbors take the time to report when pets are tied up or chained as well as not having the basic necessities – a dog house, clean water and food as well as protection from the elements.

City of Detroit ordinances address these pet-related issues. We are fortunate to have so many great and loving pet people in EEV.



Local activities to keep the munchkins happy

There are so many free and very reasonably-priced family-friendly activities to keep the kids (and their parents) from getting into trouble or becoming bored this summer. A trip to nearby Belle Isle can become a day filled with fun, laughter and even some learning in the process . . . a great spot to create lifetime family memories.

Located in the sprawling Belle Isle Park, the Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory was designed by renowned architect, Albert Kahn, and opened in 1904. Adults will love the building's domed architecture while kids will have fun exploring the gorgeous 13 acres of plants.

With more than 1,000 fish and 118 species of sea life, the Albert Kahn-designed Belle Isle Aquarium is the oldest aquarium in the United States and a perfect weekend destination (open Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.).

If the weather is nice, head to the Belle Isle Beach to enjoy a half-mile stretch of sand, water and incredible views of the city ~ perfect for photo shots. The Detroit River is also a popular spot for paddle-boarders, kayakers, and boaters. Plenty of nearby picnic areas too!

The Belle Isle Nature Center is another attraction. This free zoo is perfectly sized for young children and allows the kiddos to get up-close and personal with 19 species of Michigan wildlife. It may not be as large as many urban zoos, but charming experiences like the



Deer Encounter allow kids to feed animals and learn about wildlife conservation. There's also an ADA compliant playground outside the animal center.

Nearby, families are

enthusiastic about another Detroit-based gem ~ Mt. Elliott Park. Various species of animal pawprints embedded in cement lead you into the entrance. Located on the East Riverfront, Mt. Elliott Park is fun anytime of the year but in the summer, the schoonerthemed waterpark comes alive! Kids can play in water cascades, child-activated water cannons, windchimes and an array of fountains. It's accessible to all and has clean restrooms and a café offering a nice variety of reasonablypriced concession items and plenty of umbrella-covered seating.

A trip to Campus Martius reveals 400,000 pounds of sand converts this space to an urban beach. Located in the heart of Downtown Detroit, Campus Martius offers year-round fun with a stage, lawn and beautiful fountain. There are food trucks nearby, basketball court and, of course, this giant sandbox in which artists ~ young and old alike ~ can create castles and sculptures. The first-ever winner of the prestigious, international Urban Land Institute "Urban Open Space Award", Campus Martius Park delivers on its promise to be Detroit's Gathering Place in the immediate downtown community and for the entire city and region. Detroit's signature public space presents spectacular skyline views in an extraordinary setting.

Familiarize yourself with smart security tips

There are always smart things to do to avoid a possibly bad situation or extra work later:

• For purchases, use a credit card rather than your debit card. Scammers are known to insert devices into ATM machines as well as your grocery store scanners to collect your card's information for their own insidious (illegal) use. At least with a credit card you often have the added insurance of your credit card company's fraud practices. FYI – this tip comes from an employee at Comerica Bank's Fraud Dept.

• In the "if you see something, say something" department, please contact the Detroit Police Department 5th Precinct at 313.596.5510 or 224-DOPE with possible drug activity info. Or, if you see individuals dumping/ leaving junk in our neighborhood, contact the DPD with as much information as possible that you've observed – vehicle make/ model/color/older or newer, description of individuals involved, activities observed. Why? The MEC Radio Patrol has recently observed a shiny black Cadillac MKX (newer model) dumping junk in both EEV and Cornerstone!

Let's see if we can help stop this awful activity!

• There's a City of Detroit Ordinance against keeping/ using BBQ grills on front porches. If you or a neighbor takes this risk, please reconsider. Think about how dangerous this could be.

 A large percentage of assaults (simple and aggravated) occur between people who know each other. Then, when assaults happen, victims often do not follow through with pressing charges. Why? If you know someone in a difficult situation, the DPD-5th has a Domestic Violence Advocate who might be able to help.

• Larceny from a vehicle continues to be a problem in the 5th Precinct, but if folks would take the extra moment to NOT leave items in their

car in plain view when they run into a store, many incidences would not happen.











